I attended the Ohara Festival for the first time in my life!

I attended the 73rd Ohara Festival held in Kagoshima City from 2-3 November. The Ohara Festival is one of the largest festivals in southern Kyushu, having begun in 1949.

During the general dance of the Ohara Festival, more than 20,000 people participated and danced to the tunes of *Ohara-bushi* and *Kagoshima Hanya-bushi*, local folk songs familiar to Kagoshima people, as well as *Shibuya Ondo*, which is from the Kagoshima Ohara Festival in Shibuya. The festival is held in the Tenmonkan area, the largest shopping district in southern Kyushu, and is an event representative of autumn in Kagoshima.



I took part in the pre-event on the evening of 2nd November under the Prefectural Office Ohara Festival Club.

I prepared thoroughly for the Ohara Festival by practicing for several days prior to the festival. It was my first time to participate so I was worried about whether I would be able to dance well.

However, the choreography was actually easy to follow and there were many repetitive moves that I was able to learn very quickly. It was also the first time I had heard the songs, but I really

On the day, we gathered at the Tenmonkan with our colleagues from the International Affairs Division. There had already gathered many participants and onlookers amidst a festive atmosphere.

Ohara Matsuri, Kagoshima's largest festival, is a festival in which anyone can participate as long as they learn a simple choreography. I was able to feel the passion of Kagoshima and its people at the Ohara Festival, where foreigners such as myself were gladly welcomed.

I think this may have something to do with the regional characteristics of Kagoshima, which is located at the southernmost tip of the mainland and has always been openminded and accepting of diverse cultures and things. With these thoughts in mind, today I find myself still humming the song *Shibuya Ondo* that I can't get out of my head. (laughs)

25 October : Promoted Kagoshima products at Japan House Los Angeles

Japan House is a facility by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in Hollywood, Los Angeles, and a reception was held there to promote Japanese products to about 60 guests including local food and apparel buyers, chefs, restaurant and general merchandise store owners.

At the reception, we held a beef cutting demonstration using beef from Kagoshima Prefecture and a seminar on fermentation culture using koji. Additionally, the one-star Michelin restaurant UKA presented a special menu using seafood such as yellowtail fish and *unagi* (Japanese eel), as well as miso and soy sauce, which all the guests enjoyed.

Participants gave good ratings, such as saying that "I was amazed by the impressive cutting techniques used on the wagyu beef and the beauty of the marbling", and "I was able to savor the unique flavor of Kagoshima Wagyu beef, and it was a great experience for both the eyes and the palate."

Other exhibits representing the traditional crafts of the prefecture included authentic Oshima Tsumugi silk pongee, Satsuma Kiriko Cut Glass and Japanese samurai armor. Participants commented, "I was able to feel the history and tradition of Kagoshima, and would definitely like to visit Kagoshima."

As such, the event promoted the Kagoshima's attractions from a wide range of perspectives including food, tourism, and traditional crafts.

Tourism Information in Kagoshima

● 26, 27 October : Myoenji Temple Pilgrimage ●

This is a traditional pilgrimage that involves walking about 20km from Kagoshima City to Ijuin Town, Hioki City, and is one of the three major events in Kagoshima.

The origin of this pilgrimage begins near the end of the Warring States period, and was to commemorate Satsuma's (present-day Kagoshima) Lord Shimadzu Yoshihiro's return after a hard struggle breaking through enemy lines, to inspire morale in a time of peace, and to train one's minds and bodies.

Hence, the samurai of Kagoshima Castle (and commoners from the Meiji period onwards) began to travel a night-long, round trip of 40km clad in full armor to Myoenji Temple (Yoshihiro's family temple where he was buried) on September 14th of the lunar calendar, which was the night before the Battle of Sekigahara.

This pilgrimage continued even after the shrine was changed to Tokushige Shrine due to the abolition of Buddhism.

Today, the festival attracts more than 50,000 people and includes traditional performing arts, martial arts events, and a walking rally that attracts many families.
